Manage Leftover Latex Paint Properly



Traditionally, a lot of latex paint is brought to the District's HHW collections. Unfortunately, this results in a lot of disappointed and frustrated people when it is explained to them that latex paint is not accepted at the collection events. Latex paint is water based, and thus, when dried is not considered hazardous and may be disposed of with your regular household trash. At a time when municipal budgets are stretched, we are doing our best to ensure that limited funds set aside for household hazardous waste are used in the most efficient manner.

Try to avoid creating leftover latex paint in the first place, by buying only what you need. Typically, one gallon of paint will cover 400 square feet. Measure your project area before you buy. If you still have leftover latex paint, dry it and

then dispose of it in your household trash with the lid off. For small amounts of latex paint, pop the lid and let the liquid evaporate outdoors, in a safe and secure place away from children and pets. For larger volumes, add kitty litter, sawdust, or another type of absorbent to the paint to accelerate the drying process.
